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Hind Swaraj Hind Swaraj or Indian Home Rule is a small tract written by Gandhi in 1908. Gandhi had been living in South Africa for some years, had been to India on a visit, and on the voyage back to South Africa from London he penned this work in less than ten days, writing with his left hand when his right hand started giving him some pain.

**Hind Swaraj - MANAS**

Hind Swarajyawas written in Gujarati between November 13 and 22, 1909 on board the Kildonan Castle, on Gandhi's return trip from England to South Africa; it was published in two installments in the Gujarati section of Indian Opinion (December 11 and 19). It was then published in book form in January 1910.
